Guide for Completing Your 4-H Cloverbud Record Book

Keeping a 4-H record book is part of your overall 4-H Cloverbud experience. A 4-H Cloverbud record book is kept by 4-H'ers ages 5-7. A 4-H record book is an important part of completing each project. It is a written history of your project work. Keeping a 4-H record book helps you make plans (goals), be organized, make decisions, and just have fun.

Completing your 4-H Cloverbud Record Book can make you feel good about yourself. You did it! Your record book:

- Helps you earn credit for completing the 4-H year
- Makes you eligible to participate in other activities
- Helps you to be eligible to participate in other activities
- Helps you learn important life skills
- Gives you a chance to be recognized on the county level
- Helps you set higher goals – and more!

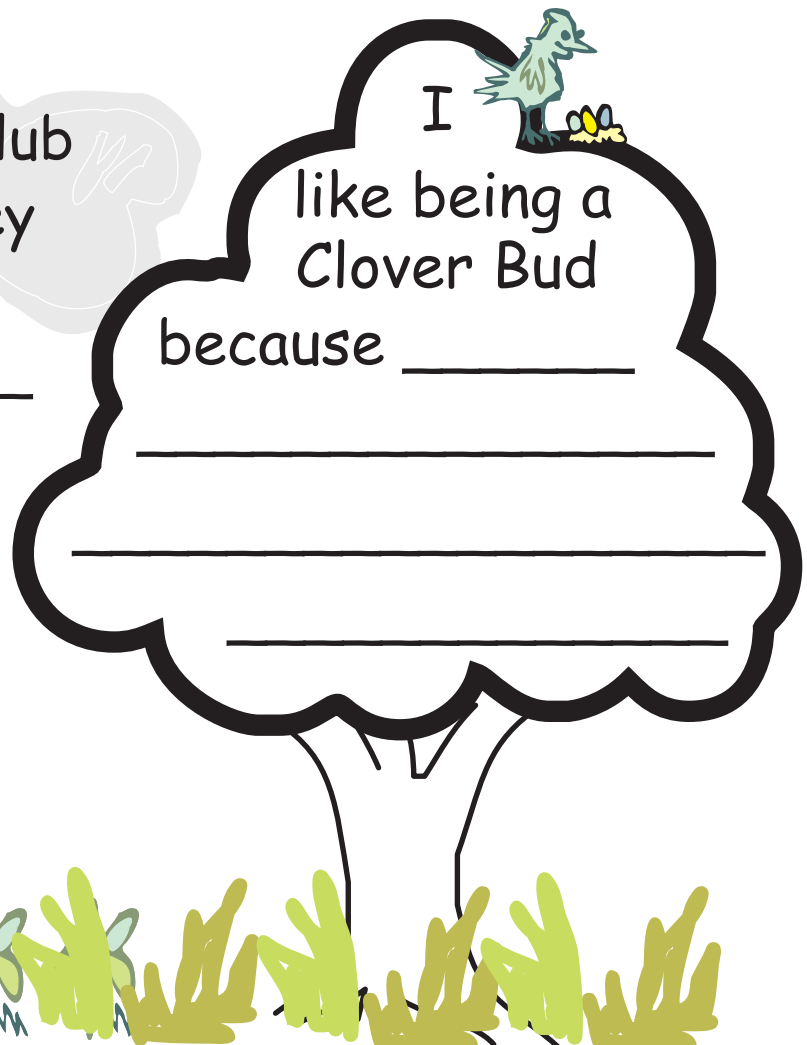

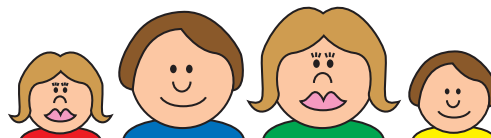
